

In Review: Invisible Man - The Audiobook

Abook! I finished some actual literature for once!
Well, an audiobook anyway.
Close enough. A print copy is available at the Hedberg library.

To radically oversimplify the book's message, Invisible Man is a book about how it is very nearly impossible to be an African-American person in America and retain your self-efficacy.

Ralph Ellison published his magnum opus back in 1952, but in a lot of ways it feels like it was written last year.

The police shooting of an unarmed black man features prominently. At every turn there is someone waiting to ignore or deny the protagonist's humanity, make him invisible.

The book itself denies him even a name, arguing that it doesn't matter. History has already forgotten our hero. But other authors have said all that before. TaNehisi Coates is a good, more recent one. Proving it wouldn't take up anywhere near the totality of Invisible Man's 500+

What distinguishes the book, more than anything, is how it addresses possible ways to fix or alleviate the problem. Mostly in the context of how none of the ones available in 1952 didn't work.

In some ways the book is very Odyssey-esque. The protagonist jumps from his childhood home, to segregated black college, to a run down bar, to a factory, to a club in Harlem, to an insane asylum, back to Harlem again, then away again, then back a second time, and finally into the metaphysical underground of all New York.

All these places contain people which offer him answers

as to how to retain his humanity, and none of their answers are perfect.

The dean of his college believes all black people should

model all their behavior on successful whites. Unionized factory workers, paranoid, immediately reject him as a scab. The civil rights group he joins ultimately proves desperate enough let the district the hero manages, Harlem, fall to black nationalist rioting so that they can use the incident as propaganda to help their movement on a wider scale.

In terms of social commentary the book offers far more

comprehensive social critique than it does planning, taking down the other ideas rather than proposing its own, but that's kinda the point. There's no single good way to fight for social justice, and there are lot of very bad ones on top of that.

As a country we certainly got more uncomplicatedly ethical unions and civil rights groups pretty shortly after '52' but the mes-

shortly after '52, but the message of finding your own way through the political problems of the world remain resonant for a lot of people, and there isn't many a better place to find it than here.

As a last note: if it is at all possible, get the Audiobook.

I'm normally not one for promoting audiobooks. Most take away from the imagination a bit and keep listeners from hearing the work in their own voice. That is not the case here.

The reader, Joe Morton, manages to play the part of dozens of different characters and make them all sound completely unique over an 18+hour run.

Ellison's rambling, run-on style proves prime material for an audio reading, and Morton never misses an opportunity to emphasize an old line into a new context, such as the ones in which the narrator describes himself as a, "disembodied voice."

Fantastic prose and audio don't always come together. If you have the time, don't miss this.

But until, and for a bit after, he showed up we were presented with a slide show and given a little Q & A in between slides and subject matters.

That was the extent of the actual Raven Studios tour.

Many of my fellow students expressed their displeasure with the longevity and lack of a physical tour (on the bus of course). However, I was grateful for so much as an opportunity to enter the building, let alone speak with the head of design, who, I might add, took time off from an incredibly important project just to speak with us.



Spanish 2 holds "Market Day"

On Monday, May 8, Sra. Baier de Garcia's students in her Spanish 2 classes held "Market Day." Students sold goods in an open market and spoke only Spanish. Sra. Baier de Garcia answered a few auestions about this annual tradition.

What is "Market Day"?

This is the oral proficiency project for this particular unit in Spanish 2. Students apply the vocabulary and grammar from the unit as they buy and sell items from their classmates.

What preparations do students make?

Students must learn how to use the vocabulary and grammar in meaningful contexts, they work with a partner to choose an item to sell. They create a poster with the name of their store, price in pesos, product list and descriptions and a slogan in Spanish. They also work to earn pesos in class, so they have money to spend at the market on our "Día del mercado." Finally. students learn how to bargain, and what that means

and looks like at an open air market. They learn the importance of being able to walk away from a sale, only to have the vendor chase you down so that you may buy at your lowest price offered!

What directions do students follow?

Students each take a turn to buy from their classmates for 15 minutes, and then sell for another 15 minutes. They must follow a script that they have memorized, that includes making a greeting, having small talk, asking to see something, discussing the item for sale and then bargaining! They learn to start high and always offer low!

How do you feel it went?

Students had so much fun buying and selling from each other! They were able to stay speaking in Spanish for these specific periods of time and

they are prepared to take their bargaining skills to a real open air market! This is an important life skill that they can put to use here going to garage sales, at a flea market or as they travel abroad. Students also developed creative business practices. As they sold out of their items, they went to other stalls to buy a large quantity of goods to resell at a higher price at their stand. It was so much fun for them to work together, speaking in Spanish! They also love when their teachers come and bargain with them in Spanish. This year, Mr. Boran-Ragotzy,

Mr. Holmquist and Ms. Grundahl visited some classes. They are always surprised to see their non-Spanish teachers able to converse and bargain with them in Spanish! We were lucky to have some AP Spanish students, Spanish 5 and Spanish 4 classes also visit our market! How long have your classes

done this?

My Spanish 2 classes have been doing this for the past 6 vears.

What goals does Market Day support for your curriculum?

As we are moving towards Oral Proficiency Based Standards, the goal is to produce students who are able to speak in real-world and meaningful situations. The American Council on Teaching Foreign Languages calls these:World Readiness Standards and defines communication as: Communicate effectively in more than one language in order to function in a variety of situations and for multiple purposes, and Interpersonal Communication: Learners interact and negotiate meaning in spoken, signed, or written conversations to share information, reactions, feelings, and opinions.



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
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
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
